

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
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












or four centuries, it was a jewel in the Spanish imperial crown. Puerto Rico marks the eastern reach of a mighty archipelago, with Cuba at the west end and Hispaniola in the center. Cooled by trade winds and soaked in tropical sunlight, Puerto Rico has now become a jewel of the entire modern Caribbean region.

No other Caribbean island is as easy to reach, with numerous direct flights connecting cities all over the United States to Puerto Rico. And no other island is better situated as a staging area for exploring the Caribbean. By boat or plane, the Windwards and Leewards, the British, the Dutch, and the French islands are all within quick and easy reach. Once storied outposts of those three empires, the islands of the Caribbean still offer quiet echoes of the lore and customs of long-vanished European colonial settlements.

The Puerto Rican population is truly unique, having sprung from Iberian and Creole origins; it's now flavored with American values and methods. Ninety-five percent of Puerto Rico's population is bilingual in English and Spanish. Yet from its pristine beaches to its rain forest, the island basks in ageless tropical splendors. Seasoned travelers often favor the "Gateway to the Caribbean" over all the other islands, simply because there's no other place like it.



ravel to Puerto Rico is simple and inexpensive. There are direct flights — many of them nonstop — from most major airports in the United States and even around the world. In all, 21 U.S. cities dispatch flights to Puerto Rico every day, and another 15 arrive from international cities, including those in Europe and Latin America. There's even a direct flight from Norway — that's how popular Puerto Rico has become in recent years. The added incentives offered by "Law 20" and "Law 22" are attracting residents and investors from many countries, including the United States. (See pages 8 and 9.)

For U.S. citizens, traveling to Puerto Rico is the same as traveling within the 50 United States. No passport is required, and there are no U.S. Customs formalities. Pack your bags and you're off.

No other Caribbean island receives as many flights from the United States as Puerto Rico. There are three international airports on the island — a record for so relatively small an aviation center. There are even three general aviation airports for people who prefer to fly themselves.

More cruise lines have designated Puerto Rico as their home port than any other destination in the Caribbean. In early 2017, 16 ships arrived on a single day. Cruising here is just as fun as flying.

The island is an ideally situated home base for people who want to explore the Caribbean in depth. They're served by scheduled and charter flights to virtually all the other Caribbean islands on U.S.-based airlines, together with several based in Europe.

Connecting flights are available for travel among the smaller — and even some of the tiny — islands. As long as there's an airport, someone will fly you there. People with private planes easily become addicted to the joys of island hopping.

For people who want to explore by sea, scheduled ferry services carry passengers from Puerto Rico to the Virgin Islands — American and British. That service is augmented by numerous other ferry systems that ply the Bahamas and the Windward Islands, including the large, cosmopolitan French ones of Martinique and Guadeloupe. Keep in mind that there you will need a passport.

Once in Puerto Rico, visitors find the usual array of rental car agencies they're used to at home. The island is ringed at the shoreline by a highway based on the U.S. interstate system. Visitors are given a feel of foreign travel, however, by the road signs, which are in Spanish, an accommodation to the island's population, 95% of whom are fluent in both Spanish and English.

There's frequent complimentary transport from San Juan airport to all major hotels in and around the capital, a thoroughly modern, convenient city. In "Old San Juan" — a United Nations World Heritage Site — there's even a free trolley to carry visitors to and from the exceptionally ancient landmark attractions.

Credit cards are accepted everywhere as readily as they are at home, and the currency is the U.S. dollar. The only preparation U.S. travelers need to make for a trip to Puerto Rico is to buy a ticket and pack their bags. Bienvenidos!


uerto Rico has embarked on an aggressive pathway to becoming an important international financial center. Facilitating real estate investments by newly arriving residents might well be the epicenter of that policy. Homebuying in Puerto Rico is governed by principles and procedures that are both similar to and dissimilar from those followed on the mainland. But the process is generously aided by incentives that don't exist "at home."


Mortgages are the rule in Puerto Rico, in the same way they are throughout the United States, although many luxury homebuyers prefer to pay cash. Mortgage rates on the island are historically low: less than 4%. Homebuying here is facilitated by Tax Act 22, or "Law 22," which vigorously encourages investment in Puerto Rico, including homeownership. The law provides total exemption from tax on dividends and interest and long-and short-term capital gains to Americans and internationals who become residents of the island. Residency requires owners to live on the island for at least 183 days a year. As a rule, the fees that amount to "closing costs" are remitted on the purchase of homes.


Puerto Rico Tax Act 273 constitutes the muscle behind the determination to make the commonwealth an international banking and financial hub. Act 273 offers generous tax incentives to new banking and financial services for off-island clients and for exports from the island. Under Act 20, service businesses are subject to an income tax rate of only 4%. And there are no federal taxes on income from Puerto Rican sources.


A further incentive removes real estate taxes altogether, beginning at a qualifying level of investment and/or purchase. The financial crisis of 2008 led to opportunities being created that make homeownership in the commonwealth more desirable than ever, at prices that can be remarkably attractive. There's never been as good a time to live in Puerto Rico.






When international investment manager John Paulson makes a move, heads turn in that direction. This was the case in the spring of last year, when Paulson & Company made headline news:

Paulson's willingness to bet on Puerto Rico signals a palpable new energy — in fact — a fresh optimism, about the benefits of living and doing business here.

According to the same Caribbean Business report, "Paulson looks forward to the future success of Harbour Lakes and Palmas del Mar as a premier resort destination in the Caribbean."

Harbour Lakes joins a prestigious portfolio of Paulson & Company properties, including the St. Regis Bahia Beach Resort, The Residences at St. Regis Bahia Beach Resort, the Serafina Beach Hotel, the La Concha Resort, and the Condado Vanderbilt Hotel. An earlier acquisition of a majority interest in the Condado Vanderbilt condominium towers in San Juan included a budget to complete construction of the property. Paulson & Company's investment in luxury real estate in Puerto Rico topped \$1.5 billion by the end of 2015 and would seem to indicate that John Paulson is electric in Puerto Rico. Given the commonwealth's highly favorable tax incentives, expanding broadband services and welcoming environment, one can share his view that the opportunity is now.

**** NO VISA. NO PASSPORT.**

If you're a U.S. citizen, travel here is uncomplicated. There's no customs, no delay: it's like traveling from one state to another. Carry your usual ID — a driver's license (or passport/birth certificate) — even though you'll encounter no special checks for it. Visitors from other countries, except those participating in the Visa Waiver Program, will need a valid passport. Foreigners will need the same visas required for visiting the United States.



TRANSPORTATION

Puerto Rico is served by an extensive local and federally funded system of roads, highways, freeways, ports, harbors and railways. Cars dominate this world, and one can only be grateful for the PR2 and PR3 freeways that run almost the entire circumference of the island, bringing you easily to its beaches and coastal wonders. Taxis are plentiful in cities. (See our tipping guide below.) The Tren Urbano is the city metro, while local taxis are gathered and dispatched from stands in each town. For "historic train tourism," narrow gauge train aficionados can look forward to the planned restoration of the old sugar plantation train, the "Tren del Sur." Uber service is also available and widely used.

ELECTRICITY

120V/60hz. Standard American outlets work just fine; no need for a converter.

** ATMS DISPENSE U.S. CURRENCY


They're easy to find everywhere except truly out-ofthe-way locations. The U.S. dollar is the currency. Beyond that you can use your credit and debit cards in a variety of locations: restaurants, shops, and all but the most "casual" food trucks and market stalls.



Cell phone and Internet service in Puerto Rico has seen consistent improvement over the past few years. The Puerto Rico Bridge initiative will put Puerto Rico ISPs on an equal playing field with their counterparts in the mainland through a fiber-optic bridge linking Puerto Rico to Florida. Cell phone service is the same as the U.S.

THE BEST TIME TO GO

Puerto Rico is a tropical island, with an average year-round temperature of 80°F / 27°C. But rather than think of it in terms of temperature, which doesn't vary much, it's better to consider its dry and rainy seasons. The dry season runs roughly from mid-December to mid-April and brings with it higher hotel rates. (But worth it to escape the North American winter, yes?) Planning far in advance can give you a rate card advantage. It's easier to find discounts in the equally pleasant shoulder seasons when the crush of tourists abates.



WHAT TO PACK

Simply put: pack for the lush Caribbean weather, with sunglasses, flip flops, sandals and perhaps an extra bathing suit, since the beaches are many and you may want to visit more than one a day. Make sure you're well supplied with a water-resistant sunscreen and DEET, a bug spray used to ward off mosquitoes that show up in early evening. Puerto Ricans dress to go out in the evening. "Casual chic" should do the trick — nice but cool. And of course, colorful.

TIPPING

It's much as it is on the U.S. mainland. Here's what the Lonely Planet* guide suggests:

BARS - \$1 per drink.

BUFFETS — Tip staff 10% to 20% if they are serving you your drinks.

LUGGAGE ATTENDANTS - \$1 to \$2 per bag for anyone who helps with your luggage, whether it's a skycap, shuttle driver, bellhop, etc.

POOL/BEACH ATTENDANTS — \$1 to \$2 for each service rendered.

RESTAURANTS - 15% to 20% of the bill.

TAXIS - 15% of the fare.

Check for service charges included in your bill at touristy restaurants, even for groups smaller than six. If possible, tip servers with cash even when paying by credit card; this precludes management taking a cut.

nly a handful of cities in the western hemisphere boast the antiquity of Puerto Rico. Juan Ponce de Leon was the founder. in 1508, of the settlement that became San Juan. Now, five centuries later, "Old San Juan" is one of the most remarkable cities to be found anywhere. It's both a National Historic Site — its U.S. distinction — and a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Meticulous restorations of important buildings now serve as museums, giving visitors intimate glimpses of Caribbean life in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries. The architecture of Old San Juan recalls similar buildings of the same period seen today in Spain. Others are in the colonial style that developed in the Western Hemisphere in response to the tropical climate. The first fortification, built in 1521, became a residence for the descendants of Juan Ponce de Leon. It was — and is — called "Casa Blanca" — The White House.

Old San Juan was attacked several times during the centuries of relentless competition among the European empire builders, but its naturally defensive location, along with cleverly designed fortresses, kept the city in Spanish control. It's one of very few Caribbean capitals to have been occupied by only one European power. The original harbor of San Juan is an excellent defense against invaders and tropical storms.

Today, Old San Juan is widely renowned for the colorful facades that enliven the houses and shops lining its streets. Fancifully applied paint and varnish make a stroll through the old city a delight. But the city's charms of today were hard won. The superb, twentieth-century restoration of Old San Juan will, quite possibly, be recalled as the most important phase of its long history.

here are so many reasons to love Palmas del Mar. But when it comes right down to it, the ocean is the thing. The sparkling, clear blue Caribbean is hard to resist — so don't. Whether you are visiting or living here, having the Yacht Club Marina in your backyard is convenient for boat owners, but can be a great perk for others as well.

On a warm evening, head to the marina and take a walk under the stars. Stroll on the docks and gaze at the incredible vessels bobbing next to each other in the water. What could be more relaxing? Then grab a bite to eat and,

perhaps, a tropical drink at the marina's Tiki Bar & Grill.

For those interested in more active pursuits, you can begin many types of ocean-bound excursions from the marina. If you are excited to explore the colorful world

under the water, several area tour guides can lead you on a mesmerizing snorkeling trip. Most trips take up a good part of the day, as they include a boat trip, at least an hour spent snorkeling, perhaps some beach time, and a meal or snack. Some popular nearby destinations include Vieques, Culebra, Monkey Island and Fajardo. These destinations have




Another popular ocean excursion is deepsea fishing. Palmas del Mar is on Puerto Rico's southeast coast, where you can go sport fishing on the Continental Shelf and the two seamounts. For a shorter excursion, choose the four-hour Continental Shelf trip, as this is only about 5 to 12 miles offshore.


> The two seamounts require a full day, but they tend to offer better results. For the novice, there's a shorter trip, just two miles from Palmas del Mar. Some of the most common fish caught on these trips include marlin, king mackerel, mahi-mahi,

yellowfin tuna, wahoo and amberjacks. You may even catch site of a whale or dolphin!

So take the plunge and take advantage of the beautiful, clear waters offshore. Whether you come back with a prize fish, some great underwater photos or some amazing memories, it's certainly worth the trip. 🔅

Bioluminescent Bays

Looking for something cool and unique to do? Don't miss Puerto Rico's spectacular biobays. This incredible and unique natural phenomena is both memorable and an incredible photo op. It's nature's answer to disco lights! Go on a kayak tour and watch as the fluorescent glow surrounds your boat in an almost unreal, sci-fi way. El Yunque

The most beloved natural attraction in Puerto Rico, El Yunque is the only tropical rain forest under the U.S. flag, The 28,000 acres of tropical wonder are at once beautiful, diverse and an important part of the country's folklore. 



Monkey Island (Cayo Santiago)


